YEAR 9 CURRICULUM

All students also select from a range of options in the Arts, Languages, and Technologies, which enable them to personalise their learning pathways. Some students will be selected to take part in Academies as part of their 'passion' learning.

LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

ADVANCED LEARNING PROGRAMME

Two Year 9 classes follow an advanced learning programme in their core subjects. These classes are exposed to increased challenge in a wide range of learning contexts and the opportunity to work towards the accelerated Year 10 programme in Mathematics and Science. The accelerated learning of these students in their junior years enables them to take a broader range of subjects in the senior school.

MENTORING

All staff support our mentoring programme which:

- Develops positive learning relationships between teachers, students and their families
- Guides students to set and achieve their learning goals
- Helps senior students track their progress and achievement
- · Assists students to plan for their future
- Enables students to have agency in their learning

Teachers, as mentors, meet with their students, to ensure they have the best opportunity to achieve positive learning outcomes. Parents are invited to attend conferences during the year to strengthen this learning partnership.

LEARNING EXTENSION

The Learning Extension Department provides a range of support for students at MRGS. They deliver the Literacy Programme to targeted junior classes to accelerate reading comprehension and provide in-class support to assist student's access to the curriculum. The department provides academic and practical support to students with moderate learning needs. They also deliver a range of programmes to those students at risk of not achieving to their potential.

HOMEWORK CENTRES

Homework consolidates classroom learning and encourages students to plan and take responsibility for their learning. The Library is open after school for all students and a number of Homework Centres operate in the afternoon or evening in a range of mother tongues. Students are encouraged to attend Homework Centres when it suits their learning needs.

MUSIC TUITION

Music tuition is available across a wide range of orchestral and band instruments as well as voice, string orchestra, concert, rock, brass and jazz bands in addition to chamber groups and vocal groups all rehearse and perform regularly, with the opportunity to compete at local and national levels.



ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

YEAR 9

The Year 9 curriculum provides a platform for future learning together with the opportunity for students to shape their programme towards their learning passions. See page 04 for more information.

YEAR 10

All students continue studying five compulsory subjects: English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science and Physical Education/Health. In addition they make choices from a wide range of option subjects. These courses are for a semester or a full year. All students in Year 10 work towards an MRGS junior diploma and attempt some Level 1 NCEA internally assessed standards in English, Science and Mathematics.

YEAR 11

All students take English, Mathematics, and three other subjects. Most students will study at NCEA Level 1 on the National Qualifications Framework.

YEAR 12

All students take English and four other subjects. Entry to Year 12 courses is based on results achieved in Year 11 with Heads of Departments having discretion in borderline cases. Entry requirements to Level 2 are detailed in the Academic Programme.

YEAR 13

All students take five subjects designed to fit their learning needs. Entry requirements to Level 3 are detailed in the Academic Programme. Exceptional students may study concurrently at the University of Auckland.

SCHOLARSHIP

High achieving Year 12 and 13 students are encouraged to enter the New Zealand Scholarship Examinations to join the long list of our successful scholars.

Our Academies contribute to the school's pursuit of excellence in sporting and cultural areas. They encourage 'passion-led' learning which complements the core elements of our curriculum.



ACADEMIES

Each student follows academic courses but their timetable is supplemented by three hours at year 9 and four hours at year 10 of specialist lessons and support within their chosen academy discipline. They grow key capabilities, skills and expertise while exploring and extending their potential in their chosen field. Academies run from the start of Semester 2, Year 9 until the end of Semester 1, Year 10.

BASKETBALL

Basketball is more than a game. We are dedicated to developing purposeful young leaders, committed to uplifting the mana of those around them. Through basketball, we want to build resilient students who take pride in the mental, physical and technical aspects of the game and in representing their school and community.

FOOTBALL

The academy develops football players technically, tactically and physically while supporting academic success and engagement through an extensive reading writing and thinking curriculum taught 'through the lens' of football.

HOCKEY

Integrating with their regular studies, our hockey academy students learn advanced skills and tactics together with personal health and physical development. This comprehensive programme supports our students to excel on the hockey turf.

PERFORMING ARTS

Our most passionate young performers, students will improve their dance and drama repertoire through a focus on technical and performance skills. Students will perform in multiple events, experience several trips to see performances and have the opportunity to work with professionals from the local Performing Arts industry.

RUGBY

The academy promotes understanding of the techniques and technicalities of the game in addition to a focus on personal fitness and nutrition. Students develop both their personal and rugby skills while being expected to participate in a school team. Work on literacy and numeracy will take place as part of the programme to support their classroom studies.

SPORTING EXCELLENCE

The school's sports programme takes two pathways — excellence and participation. We have many outstanding coaches willing to go the extra mile for our students and achieving some great results in the process. With every sport, we also offer teams for those students who wish to play with their friends as well as develop their skills.

OPPORTUNITIES AND FACILITIES:

With over 20 sports codes offered playing all over the Auckland Region, there are opportunities for most to be involved. Students are encouraged to participate in a wide range of co curricular activities with the aim of balancing their academic work with a physical outlet in the sports domain. We have sport and active recreation opportunities for the competitive and social student, no matter what the ability. We are well supported with excellent facilities including three gymnasiums, a fitness centre, hockey turf, an outdoor pool, turfed playing courts and grass fields.

SPORTS EXCHANGES AND TOURNAMENT WEEK:

MRGS has annual Sports Exchanges with Mahurangi College and Pukekohe High School with our Premier Sports Teams competing against each other. We also organise matches with other schools from outside of the region and have teams regularly attending National and Regional tournaments in both Summer and Winter Tournament weeks.

CHAMPIONS AND COMPETITIONS:

In recent years Mount Roskill Grammar students have excelled in Football, Basketball, Swimming, Badminton, Lacrosse, Hockey and Cricket. In recent years we have had Boys and Girls Football competing in their Premier competitions, Basketball Girls and Boys continuing in Senior A grades, Hockey Boys in the Supercity A Grade, Boys' Cricket making finals in the A1 competition and Swimmers collecting medals at National competitions.

AUCKLAND AND NATIONAL REPRESENTATIVES:

Many of our students have represented Auckland in Badminton, Basketball, Cricket, Football, Hockey, Lacrosse and Rugby and we have had national representatives in Badminton, Football, and Lacrosse.



CO-CURRICULAR OPPORTUNITIES

At Mount Roskill Grammar School, we acknowledge and celebrate many cultural events including Diwali, Chinese New Year, Eid, Matariki, Māori, Samoan, Tongan and Cook Island Language Weeks.

MĀORI AND POLYNESIAN CULTURAL FESTIVAL

Our Kapa Haka, Mana Taiohi, is an integral part of the school, leading powhiri to welcome new students and distinguished visitors. They also represent our school at sporting exchanges and perform at special events in the school calendar. Various cultural groups, including Mana Taiohi, Tongan, Samoan, Indian and African groups have excelled in representing the School in the annual Māori and Pacific Island Cultural festival and in community and national events.

MUSIC PERFORMANCE

There is a strong performance culture in the school with regular appearances at assemblies and involvement in several competitions such as KBB Band and Orchestral Festival. Pacifica Beats, Rockquest Bands, Stand Up Stand Out talent quest, NZCT Chamber Music Competition as well as vocal groups' involvement in community events, presentations and national competitions for Boys' Barbershop and Choir.

DANCE AND DRAMA

There are opportunities for students to perform Drama and Dance works as part of the PFA Whānau's Auaha Project which puts an emphasis on growing student leadership as well as working with professionals in the Performing Arts Industry. Students who opt to take a Performing Arts option have the ability to perform in one of our Showcases, Productions (which have won many Auckland Showdown Awards) or Dance Festivals such as TEMPO and YouDance (for which our school is highly regarded).

DEBATING

Junior, Senior and Advanced teams excel in regional and national competitions where thinking, public speaking and teamwork come together.

CHESS

We are the most successful New Zealand school at chess in regional, national and international competitions. We are the current ChessPower National champions and have won the Australasian Girls Team Championship four times. Several of our students hold the Junior Master title. At the time of going to press, our students are Auckland Girls Under 18 and Under 16 champions, and one is a past NZ School Girl Champion.

ESPORTS

We have achieved significant success in recent years in esports, including placing second in New Zealand in the 2020 League of Legends championships, having previously been champions for two consecutive years.

INCLUSION AND ADVOCACY

We have strength in student groups supporting others and a range of student led groups advocate for individual, local, national and international change.



We develop active citizens with the personal qualities of respect for others, sensitivity to diversity and difference, commitment to participation and a desire to work for the good of the community.





LEADERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

A significant number of opportunities are provided for students to develop their leadership skills. As well as in the classroom, students at all levels can take on leadership roles.

House Captains, Sports Captains, Student Health Councillors, Peer Tutors, Academic Mentors, Peer Support Leaders, Mediators, Guides, Multi-cultural Group Leaders, House Committee members, Peer Sexuality Support Leaders, Body Image Leaders, Live for Tomorrow and YWCA Future Leaders all contribute and give worthwhile service to their fellow students.

SCHOOL PREFECTS

Each year a group of Year 13 students are chosen as Prefects to lead the school. They are selected on three main criteria:

- · Leadership skills
- · Quality of character
- Support for the School and participation in school activities

Selected Prefects undergo further specific training for their important role.

EXCELLENT ESOL SUPPORT

We can provide foundation English tuition for students to improve their English AND earn credits before moving to mainstream classes. We regularly assess progress and provide individual timetables with extensive subject choice and career advice.

AN EMPHASIS ON STUDENT SUPPORT

Students enjoy a full orientation programme on arrival, assisted by student leaders. Accommodation and ongoing support are organised by an experienced International Department. Emergency help is available 24/7.

STUDENT SUPPORT

Our school provides students with a structure of a House system, which in partnership with families foster good routines and clear expectations of behaviour within an orderly and ethical environment supported by restorative practices.

HOUSES

The School is divided into five Houses to provide students with an identity in a large school. Each House has three Deans who supervise house activities and set expectations of student behaviour and habits of learning and provide pastoral and academic support, welfare and guidance. House assemblies are held fortnightly and inter-house events are arranged during the year in activities such as volleyball. basketball. netball. athletics and swimming. Through their houses students are also encouraged to be of service to the wider community by fundraising for charities.

HUI AKO

There are 15 Hui ako in each House. They consist of fewer than 30 students. Hui ako also meet for mentoring and learning sessions. A student remains in the same Hui ako for the duration of their time at the school.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Guidance: Students can self-refer to our Counsellors for support. All Counsellors are members of the New Zealand Association of Counsellors and abide by its code of ethics. They are led by Ms Margaret Hoogendoorn.

HEALTH

The school has three fully qualified nurses and an on-site part-time doctor and physiotherapist. The nurses, led by Ms Rose Halpin, oversee the health and wellbeing of students, administer medication to them by arrangement with parents, and liaise with parents, dentists and the Public Health Nurse as the need arises.



CAREERS

Students have access to a powerful resource in the Career Department. Students are given support for development of their own career exploration. Students of all levels have access to the service available from the Career Counsellor.

These include in-depth one to one career exploration interviews, assistance with option choices and job search access to course and career information and access to industry and tertiary professionals.

Students wanting a career appointment are asked to contact the career counsellor at the school.

EXPECTATIONS

We take pride in bringing credit to ourselves, our families and our school. Our expectations of how students engage in their learning with each other and in the community are supported by our core values of Manaakitanga, Tūmanakotanga and Whanaungatanga.

SCHOOL ORGANISATION

IN-ZONE

Mount Roskill Grammar School's enrolment scheme involves a geographic zone from which a student may be enrolled as an in-zone student.

DESCRIPTION OF ENROLMENT ZONE

From the Manukau Harbour via Waikowhai Road and Hillsborough Road (both excluded) to Dominion Road Extension, via Dominion Road Extension (excluded) to Richardson Road, thence via Richardson Road (excluded), May Road and Stoddard Road (both included) to Sandringham Road via Sandringham Road (excluded) to Mt Albert Road via Mt Albert Road (included), Renfrew Avenue (excluded), Invermay Avenue (included), Landscape Road (excluded), via St Andrews Road (excluded), to Mt Albert Road (included), hence via Hillsborough Road (excluded) to Hillsborough Cemetery/Richardson Road Corner and Manukau Harbour.

IN-ZONE ENROLMENTS

- Proof of your address as indicated on the enrolment form

OUT-OF-ZONE

The school will accept out-of-zone applications for 2023 for all year levels. After applications close, the Board of Trustees will determine the number of out-of-zone applicants it will accept at each level, and if necessary hold a ballot. All applicants will then be informed of the outcome of the ballot. Out-of-zone application forms may be obtained from the administration office or the website.
